

**Regent Parrot**

*Polytelis anthopeplus monarchoides*

Listed as Vulnerable in Australia and South Australia.

This shy parrot puts on a colourful display with prominent yellow covering its head and chest, olive green shoulder patches, and dark blue wing tips and tail. Its most distinctive feature is a red beak, which matches red patches in the middle of the wings.



**Mount Lofty Ranges Southern Emu-wren**

*Stipiturus malachurus intermedius*

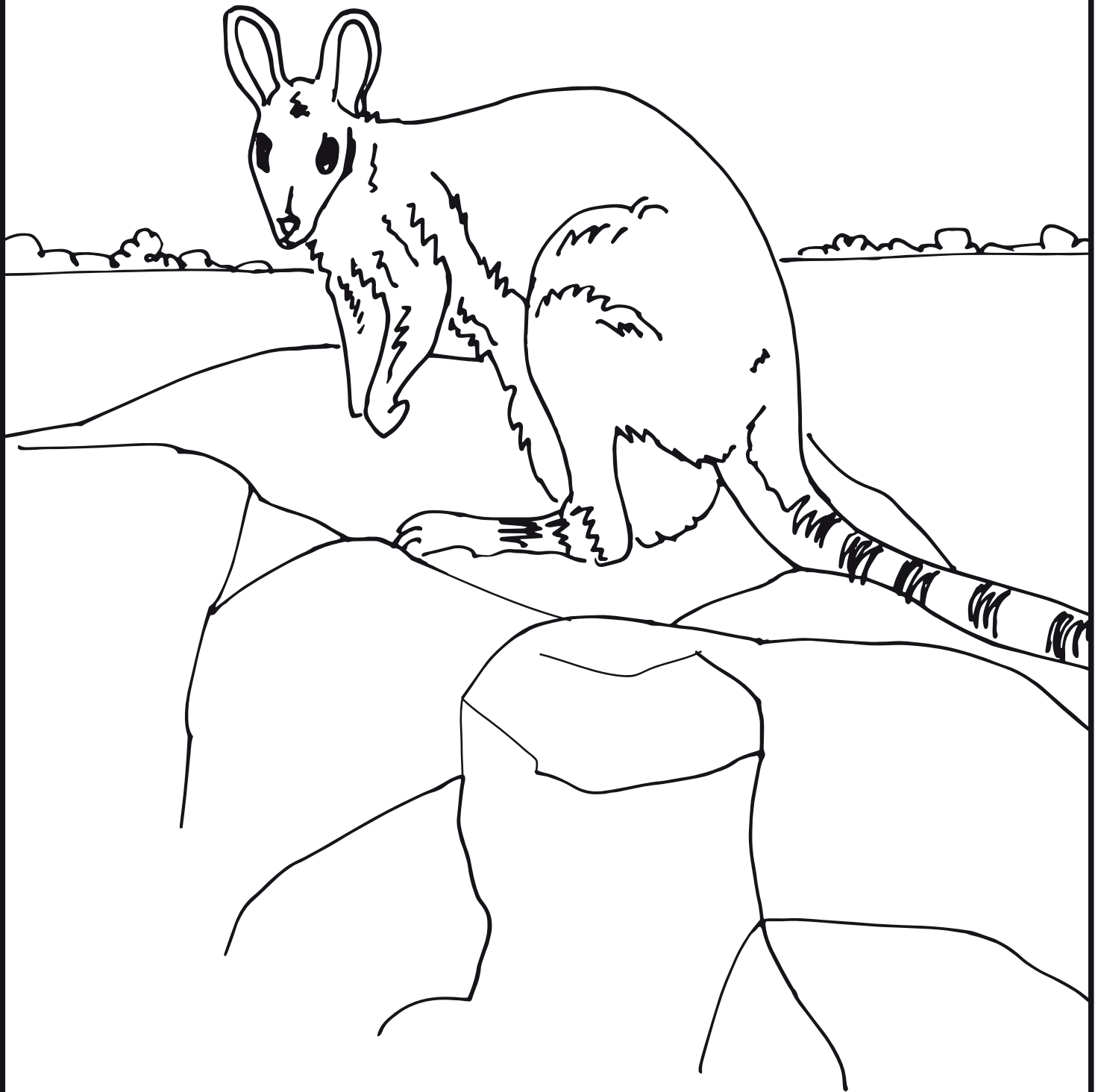
Listed as Endangered in Australia and South Australia. Named for its spectacular emu-like tail feathers, this tiny bird is one of Australia's smallest—and shyest—birds. Male birds have a distinctive sky-blue patch on their chest, just under their chin. The body is covered in delicate brown feathers while the top of its head is more orange than brown.

**Yellow-footed Rock-wallaby**

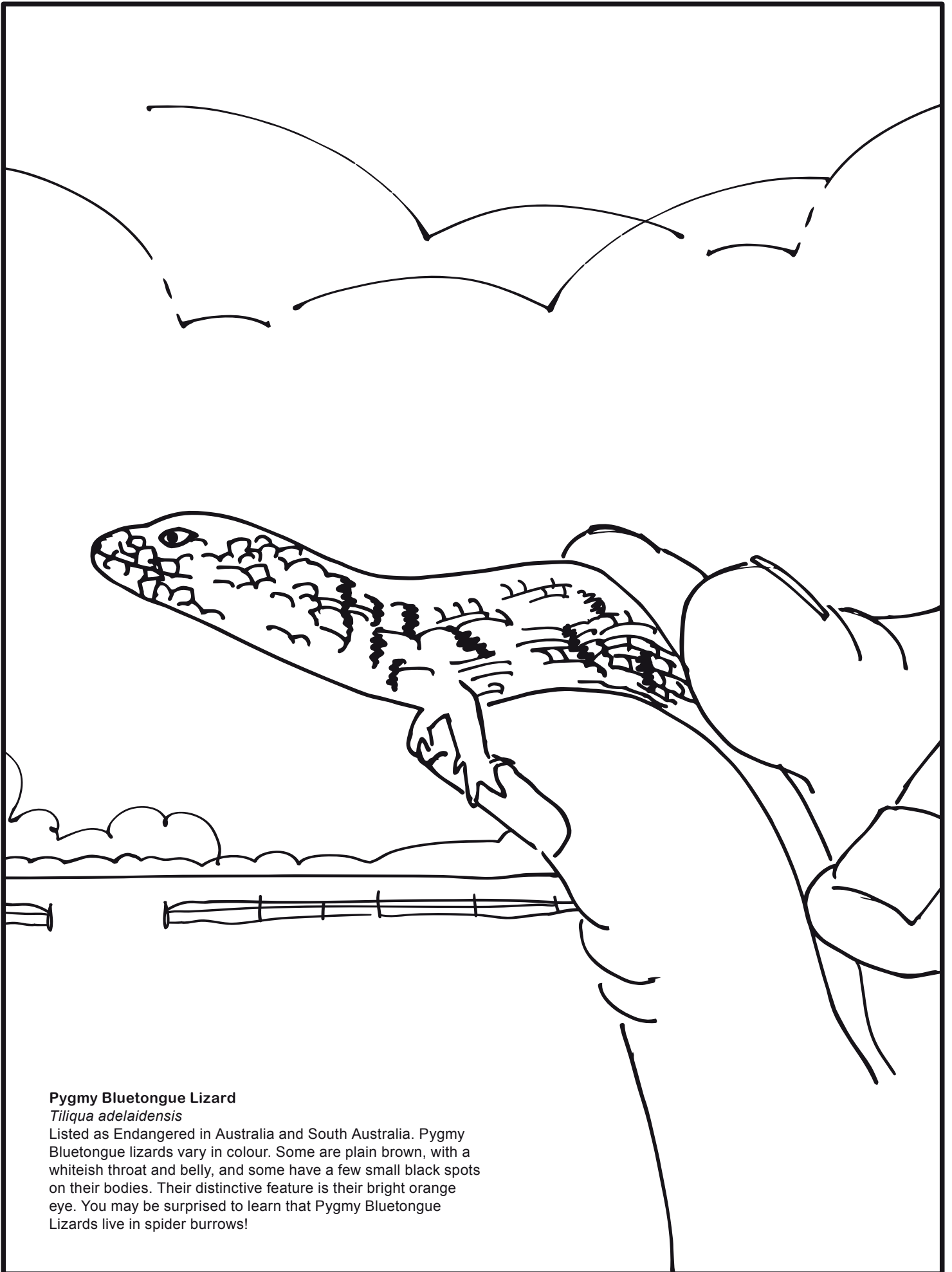
*Petrogale xanthopus xanthopus*

Listed as Vulnerable in Australia and South Australia.

Living in isolated rocky hills and granite outcrops, the Yellow-footed Rock-wallaby can jump as far as 4 metres between rocks. They have a white belly, and their back and sides are grey. Their arms and legs are an orangey-brown, with dark brown hands and toes, and dark brown rings along their tail. This colouring helps them to blend into their surroundings on rocky outcrops.



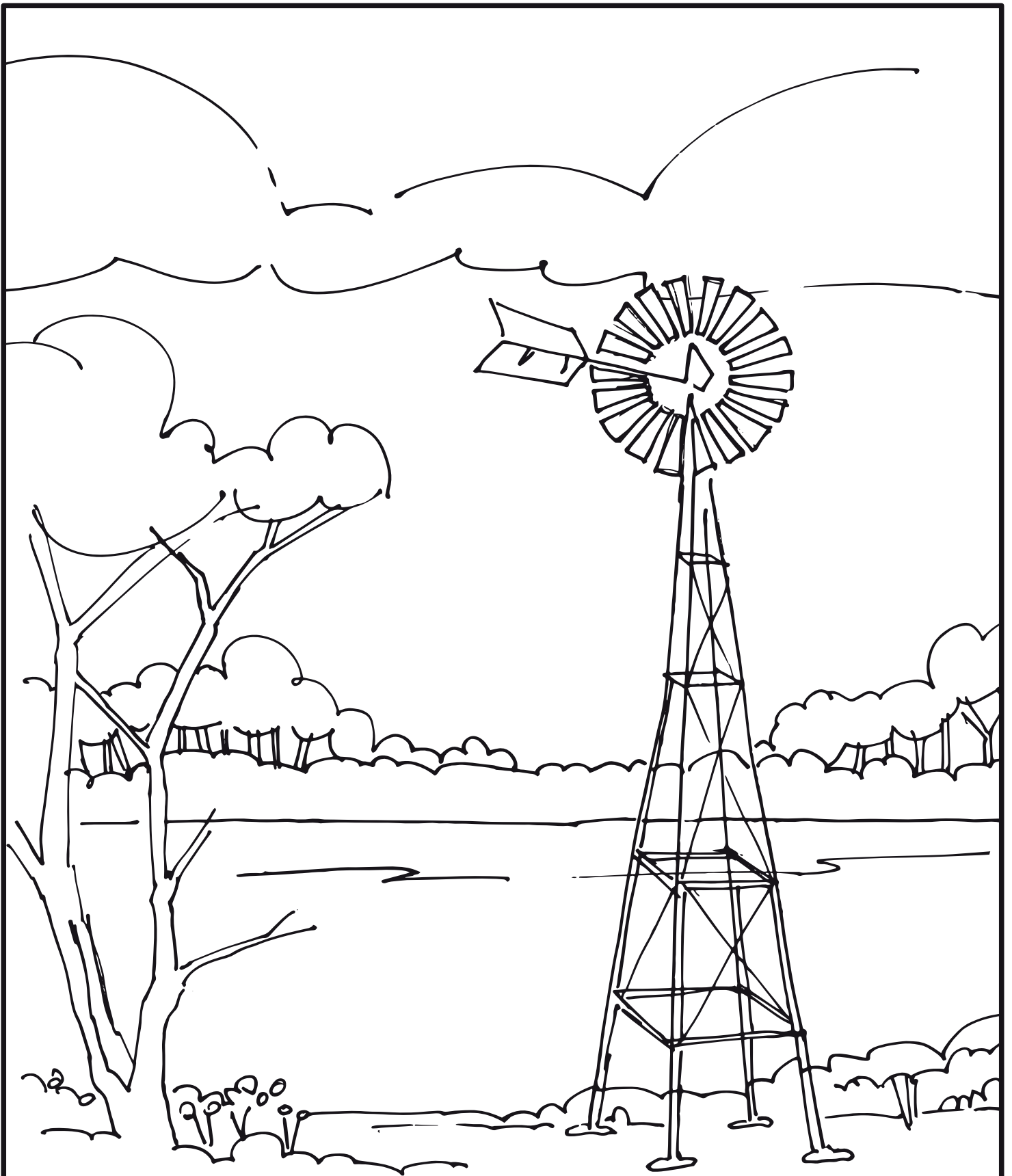
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**Pygmy Bluetongue Lizard**

*Tiliqua adelaidensis*

Listed as Endangered in Australia and South Australia. Pygmy Bluetongue lizards vary in colour. Some are plain brown, with a whiteish throat and belly, and some have a few small black spots on their bodies. Their distinctive feature is their bright orange eye. You may be surprised to learn that Pygmy Bluetongue Lizards live in spider burrows!



**Murbpook Lagoon**

360 ha (3.6km<sup>2</sup>)

Murbpook Nature Reserve is located on the western side of the River Murray between Blanchetown and Morgan, and is home to 17 state and nationally rated threatened fauna species and two state rare flora species.



**Glossy Black-cockatoos**

*Calyptorhynchus lathami halmaturinus*

Listed as Vulnerable in Australia and South Australia. Now extinct on mainland Australia, this subspecies of the Glossy Black-cockatoo has its last refuge on Kangaroo Island. These striking birds are mainly brown and black—including their beaks—with vivid red feathers in their tail.
